## **Tons of Legislation Introduced**

First 8 Days: Legislators Introduce Numerous Amendments to Georgia Constitution Those that pass will be on the 2022 General Election ballot.

H.R. 4 Georgia General Assembly Term Limits for Representatives and Senators limits representatives to six consecutive terms, increases senator terms to four years, limits them to three terms. Currently, all Georgia legislators serve two-year terms, with unlimited re-election. ACTION – Oppose. Two-year terms give voters more control. # **H.B. 113 Register and Vote on Election Day** introduced by Representative Kim Alexander January 27<sup>th</sup> authorizes same-day registration and voting.

**H.B. 120 Georgia Resident In-State Tuition Act** introduced January 27<sup>th</sup> by Representative Kasey Carpenter authorizes in-state tuition for noncitizens under age 30. It allows in-state tuition for illegal aliens in the U.S., despite this current law: "Noncitizen students shall not be classified as in-state for tuition purposes unless the student is legally in this state..."

**H.B. 1 Forming Open and Robust University Minds (FORUM) Act,** introduced January 29<sup>th</sup> by Representative Josh Bonner, prohibits the limitation of lawful expressive communication – verbal, audio-visual, electronic – on campuses of public institutions of higher learning. It would protect all peaceful assembly, literature distribution, carrying signs, circulating petitions, demonstrations, protests, and speeches, including guest speakers.

### **More Nitty-Gritty**

- **Sports Gambling Passed House Committee into House Rules Committee H.B. 86 Georgia Lottery Mobile Sports Wagering Integrity Act** by Representative Mickey Stephens, introduced January 26<sup>th</sup>, explicitly, targets anyone age 21 or older to use cell phones and other mobile devices to gamble on online sports, despite its addictive nature. 90% of PG (pathological gamblers) gambled with their paychecks or family savings; 30% had gambling debts of \$75,000 \$150,000. Some used loan sharks to pay their debt. (www.GeorgiaGamblingHelp.org) **ACTION Urgent! Act NOW to OPPOSE sports betting.** H.B. 86 passed the House Economic Development & Tourism Committee 19-7 on February 2<sup>nd</sup> and went to the37-member House Rules Committee. - **H.B. 21 Criminalizes "Bias" Thought** introduced January 26<sup>th</sup> by Representative Sandra Scott creates a crime for reporting incidents to 9-1-1 that the operator might think might be based on a person's lifestyle OR might be intended to intimidate someone or some group. There's no mention of whether such reports would or would not be investigated if "bias" is suspected. **ACTION Oppose.** Call Judiciary Non-Civil Committee Representatives listed under H.R. 13 on page one.
- H.B. 71 Mandatory Pre-Kindergarten and Kindergarten introduced by Representative Donna McLeod January 14<sup>th</sup> asks the State Board of Education to (a) establish a four-year pilot program in up to six local school systems to learn the feasibility of mandatory pre-kindergarten and kindergarten for all children before entering first grade. (b) Such schools must provide free breakfast, lunch and transportation for all students. (c) A preferred funding plan is outlined. ACTION Oppose. Parents are currently free to choose whether to send their children to pre-K or K. - H.B. 9 Physical and Mental "Telehealth" for Students in School Representative Sandra Scott introduced January 26<sup>th</sup> to authorize the use of "communication technologies, including but not limited to, telephones, remote patient monitoring devices, or other electronic means to facilitate the assessment, diagnosis, consultation, treatment, education, care management, and self-management of a student's health care when the health care provider is at a remote location and the student is at a school or is participating in any school related function." Considering the fact that, unknown to parents, pregnant girls have been whisked out of school to get an abortion I shudder to think what could/would result with such control of students' MINDS and BODIES. - **S.B. 17 Whole Child Model Schools Act** by Representative Emanuel Jones introduced January 26<sup>th</sup> to implement a collaborative approach to education (mind) and health (physical /mental) in elementary and secondary schools in cooperation with "community organizations" and "community partners." 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### Horse Racing & Pari-Mutuel Betting Disguised as the "Rural Georgia Jobs & Growth Act"

#### **Flurry of Election Bills**

- H.B. 132 Operating Procedures for County Elections and Voter Registration introduced by Representative Mesha Mainor January 29<sup>th</sup> requires county election superintendents and boards of registrars to follow State Election Board guidelines to (a) process absentee applications and ballots, (b) verify signature on envelopes and other documents, (c) present qualifications and job descriptions of officials and staff. - **H.B. 59 Special Absentee Ballot for Overseas Citizens & Military Personnel** introduced by Representative Wes Cantrell January 13<sup>th</sup> requires the Secretary of State to prepare special absentee ballots for general primary runoffs and general election runoffs for use by qualified elector who are entitled to vote by absentee ballot per federal law.

- **S.B. 26 Ballot Drop Boxes** introduced January 27<sup>th</sup> by Senator Sheikh Rahman requires a drop box at each advance voting location in all counties. Result: voter fraud will be much easier! **ACTION Oppose.** Reportedly, at least one drop box disappeared from its location for three days before it resurfaced. - **S.B. 40 Monitor, Open, Count, Scan Absentee Ballots** by Representative Jennifer Jordan introduced January 28<sup>th</sup>, designates the second Monday before a primary, election, or runoff as opening day for absentee ballots, tabulation and scanning of such votes. Data gleaned thereby must be kept secret until 7:00 p.m. Election Day. Premature sharing of that secret data is illegal. **ACTION Support**. Call Ethics Committee Senators listed under S.B. 26 above.
- **S.B. 39 Deletes Purchase/Possession of Controlled Substance from Moral Turpitude Law** introduced January 28<sup>th</sup> by Senator Harold Jones allows re-registration of voters taken off the voter list for buying/possessing/making/distributing/selling a controlled substance or marijuana. **ACTION Oppose.** Call Ethics Committee Senators listed above under S.B. 26.
- **S.B. 38 Permanent Absentee Ballot Request** introduced by Senator Elena Parent January 28<sup>th</sup> authorizes a permanent absentee voter list so voters automatically get future absentee ballots. **ACTION Oppose.** Call Ethics Committee Senators listed above under S.B. 26.
- **S.B. 29 Absentee Ballot Applications Must Include Copy of Document as ID** introduced by Senator Jason Anavarte allows absentee ballot applicants to prove identity with a copy of any form containing their permanent or temporary address. This makes voter fraud very easy. **ACTION Oppose.** Call Ethics Committee Senators listed above under S.B. 26.
